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INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND OF ORGANIZATION

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Mid-South, Inc.'s mission is to provide children facing adversity with strong and enduring, professionally supported one-to-one relationships that change their lives for the better, forever. Since 1968, our agency has operated under the practices of our national affiliate to ensure that our programs continue to have the greatest impact in the lives of children. Over the years our mentoring programs have successfully paired and supported mentoring relationships that has changed the lives of over 65,000 youth in the Mid South. As a one-to-one mentoring organization we have pair thousands of children with positive role models through our Community-Base and Site Base Programs. The Community Base Program has a retention rate of 92%. The Site Base Program has a retention rate of 76% due to the loss of communication between the volunteer and child over the summer months. In order to increase the retention rate and help facilitate suitable relationships over the summer between our Site Base matches, Big Brothers Big Sisters has implemented Bridge the Summer Gap summer sessions. The sessions convene at a central meeting place for mentors and mentees over the summer with a primary focus on safety, financial literacy, personal health and college readiness. Funds secured for the Bridge the Summer Gap Sessions will be used to purchase supplies, cover the cost of transportation, food and support staffing.

Big Brothers Big Sisters is committed to not only providing children with positive role models, but also, giving them the tools to be responsible contributing adults in our community. To help us carry out the vision of empowering the children in our programs with necessary life skills, we have created Bridge the Summer Gap – Life Enhancing Skills for Kids Group Sessions. This module consists of four primary focus areas: Safety, Financial Literacy, Personal Health and College Readiness. Safety - The Safety Program will cover topics related to personal safety such as bullying, cyber bullying, proper and safe use of the internet specifically focusing on how “stranger danger” extends to beyond social media. Various types of bullying will be discussed, as well as, what is bullying, who is a bully and how to respond in a situation involving bullies. (Topics of discussion will include internet safety, stranger danger at school and in the community, cyber bullying and bullying) Financial Literacy - Our Financial Literacy Program lays the foundation for successful money management by providing young people opportunities to gain age-appropriate knowledge and skills for today and in the future. We believe that as a child's knowledge of money grows, so does his or her respect for money and the likelihood of smart financial decisions in the future. (Topics of discussion will include the importance of saving, saving money at home vs. bank,

creditworthiness) Personal Health - Personal Health Research experts agree that many children have poor dietary habits and are physically inactive. The Personal Health Program will help children make better nutrition choices and learn the benefits of physical activity. (Topics of discussion will include healthy food choices, physical fitness discussions and etiquette) College Readiness- Low-income students often lack the guidance and support needed to prepare for college. The enrollment process and applying for financial aid is overwhelming for many of our first generation college students. As a result, large gaps remain in educational achievement between students from low-income families and their high-income peers. We propose to reach, inspire, and empower every student, regardless of background. (Topics of discussion will include the College Admission process, how to apply for scholarships, reference letters, volunteer hours, resume building - ages 14- 18)

General Operating Support

Each session will be presented by a qualified staff member of Big Brothers Big Sisters and professionals from various business sectors. The total funding required to continue to carry out this program is \$50,000 which includes: The Financial Literacy, Safety and Personal Health sessions will be attended by 400 children at four sites (Springdale, Hanley, Balmoral and Cornerstone Elementary). The College Readiness session will be offered to all BBBS program participants. This session will be held at the BBBS office and will include college tours to the University of Memphis and Rhodes College. healthy habits are often forgotten, especially for children in low-income families. Bridge the Summer Gap Group Sessions will focus on ensuring that children in our program remain connected to their mentor during the summer months and simultaneously address the critical life skills that all youth need. The mentors will help reinforce the skill through one on one interaction during the summer and into the academic school year thru the life skills sessions. Bridge the Summer Gap Sessions will be held in a safe environment where kids feel welcome to develop character and explore new interests. The Sessions are designed to address challenges that children in single parent, low income households face such as financial instability, lack of proper physical activity, limited ability to make healthy food choices and the lack of guidance in college preparation.

Our agency is both vested in our community and committed to helping Memphis' citizens attain higher aspirations and educational achievement. By positively influencing the city's future - our kids, it will have a direct and lasting impact on education, public safety and economic development in the Mid-South.

The measures for success for the program will be based on the number of students (400) completing the Bridge the Gap, Life Enhancing Skills for Kids sessions. As a result of the sessions four partnering school sites will receive the Bridge the Gaps-Life Enhancing Skills sessions focusing on child safety, financial literacy, personal health and college readiness that will teach them basic tools needed to begin the journey of making good decisions that can be impactful and life changing in the future of each child. Prior to and upon completion of the sessions each participate will complete our Youth Outcome Surveys that will benchmark skills and knowledge in the areas of personal safety, financial literacy, personal health and higher education aspiration and college readiness. These results will be compared at the end of the sessions in order to adequately quantify the amount of usable life skills each participate retained.
